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OVERVIEW

This Diagnostic Training Series is facilitated by a group of Allied Mental health professionals in partnership with the Georgia Society for Clinical Social Workers (GSCSW). The presenters include Professional counselors, Clinical Social Workers, as well as one colleague who will soon be dually licensed as a Marriage and Family Therapist here in the state of Georgia.

We are offering continuing education workshops to support those Licensees who are seeking to meet the Licensure criteria set forth by the Georgia State legislature in its passage of Senate Bill 319 signed into law on April 26, 2016.

This law granted licensed counselors in the state of Georgia the right to diagnosis mental illnesses as described by the diagnostic and statistical Manual of Mental Disorders (DSM-V). It stipulates that licensees under the GA Composite Board for Licensed Professional Counselors, Clinical Social Workers and Marriage and Family Therapists are required to have taken a graduate course in psychopathology or related course title that includes the DSM-V and diagnosis.

Those licensees who have been independently licensed for 10 years by April 26, 2016 are exempt from the education requirement in senate bill 319.

Even though the diagnosis law gave counselors the right to diagnosis, its impact includes any licensees under the composite board's purview who have not met the educational criteria of a 3 semester hour graduate course in diagnosis.

The composite board was charged with developing education criteria for those who did not have a graduate course that meets the diagnosis content requirements.

The composite board accepted the input and support of the professional associations (GSCSW, LPCA-GA & AAMFT-GA) to develop training curriculum requirements. The requirements for licensees are to complete 45 hours of continuing education in diagnosis by December 31, 2017.

*This continuing education series is open to any licensee who wants to attend for CE credits. Those who are not taking this series because of the licensing board diagnosis course rule do not have to attend 45 hours from this event.

<u>Title:</u> Understanding People: Ethical Approach to Diagnostic Interviewing, Case Conceptualization and Treatment (5 Ethics CE's)

Presenter: Kristin Ryan, LPC

Purpose:

Provide an understanding of abnormal behavior and current accepted definition of mental disorder. Culture and discerning between diagnosis and clinical issues is also discussed. Present the importance of diagnosis and how it fits into the treatment process. Provide a model for completing a simple, yet thorough, effective and ethical diagnostic assessment and providing a diagnosis, including demonstration and/or video of the process. Review case conceptualization and treatment planning. Review the DSM 5 and its use as a reference guide

Objectives:

- Understand the role of diagnosis in clinical practice including clinical, cultural, legal and ethical implications.
- Learn an effective model for completing a diagnostic assessment.
- Increase working knowledge of abnormal behavior, effective treatment and the DSM 5 for quality clinical care.

Purpose:

Clinicians attending this training will provide clinicians with an in-depth review of the spectrum of mood disorders in the DSM-V, including a historical look at our treatment (as a profession and as a society) of mood disorders. Clinicians will be presented with several prevailing theories that attempt to describe mood disorders and implications for assessment and treatment.

Objectives:

- Participants will demonstrate ability to describe, explain key terms, differentiate between concepts, and discuss various theoretical frameworks for understanding stress, trauma, and anxiety, OCD, depression and adjustment disorders, bipolar disorders.
- Participants will obtain a general overview of our profession's historic treatment of these disorders – diagnosis, treatment, and related ethical issues.
- Participants will demonstrate ability to discuss and apply diagnostic criteria for, ethical issues surrounding, and competencies for providing treatment re: DSM V's related diagnoses.
- Participants will gain an understanding of current cultural and socio-political factors impacting mood disorders.
- Participants will demonstrate ability to describe and discuss commonly cooccurring disorders, and discuss and practice differential diagnosis skills.
- Participants will demonstrate knowledge of best practices for treating mood disorders, competencies for clinicians, and additional resources for clients and further clinician education.
- Participants will discuss other intersectional issues related to mood disorders, including age, race, culture, gender, sexuality, ability and religion.

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OPTION B: Mood Disorders

<u>Title:</u> **DE-STRESS from DISTRESS: Diagnosis and Treatment of Anxiety and Stress Disorders** (1 hour of ethics CE's included in this total 5 CE workshop)

Objectives:

- The objective of this course is to provide uniform information regarding somatic conditions and dissociative traits and symptoms.
- This course will discuss assessment techniques and provides clinicians with options for referrals to specialist of these disorders.
- In this course we will explore the conditions that bring us reason for symptomology of somatic disorders and explore the latest research and clinical applications of dissociative mental conditions.

Purpose:

Can't Eat, Can't Sleep- To examine the relationship of eating and sleeping to various mental health disorders, as well as assessment differential diagnosis specifically related to eating disorders and sleep disorders. - Participants will obtain a general overview of our profession's historic treatment of these disorders and dual diagnosis treatment, and related ethical issues.
- Participants will demonstrate ability to discuss and apply diagnostic criteria for, differential diagnosis of and competencies for providing treatment re: DSM V's substance, addictive, disruptive, conduct and impulse control disorders.
- Participants will gain an understanding of current cultural and socio-political factors impacting these disorders.
- Participants will demonstrate knowledge of best practices for treating clients struggling with these disorders at multiple levels of care, competencies for clinicians, and additional resources for clients and further clinician education.
- Participants will discuss other intersectional and cultural issues affecting the treatment of these disorders, including age, race, gender, sexuality, ability, culture (including 12-step culture, stigma, and prevailing philosophical ideals of the current treatment community), and religion.
